RIVERBANK PROJECT – THE GENTLE APPROACH

After meeting with lots of different concerned parties, we now have a project proposal to go out and seek extra funding with. Learning from the mistakes of the past, the Friends are keen to work with nature rather than against it. Many people will remember a few years ago when council contractors were sent in to clear the bank. This was all done in a very short space of time and the result made that part of the park look ravaged for a few months and then the undergrowth simply grew back again.

We are proposing to take our time clearing the bank, using a small team of people on employment training, working one day a week. On one Saturday a month, we will hold a volunteer day, when extra people can spend a few hours helping. In this way, we hope to gradually get the bank under control over a period of 3 years – a far more gentle approach. We hope the public will gradually get used to the idea of the space being cared for again and be less fearful of the pace of change. In this way, we can also tackle the more contentious parts of the project, for example the beech hedge running along the promenade. It is a magnificent beech hedge, but its height completely obliterates the river view for any children or people in wheelchairs on the promenade. The hedge also encourages people to drop their litter over it – out of sight, out of mind. We propose to gradually reduce the height of the hedge, allowing a full recovery each year and enabling its lower branches to fill out. At the end of three years we hope to have a healthy well-maintained hedge that even little people can see over!

LEARNING ON THE GREEN

Mark Hubbard, Chair of the Friends has been meeting with various stakeholders in the city – Hereford Cathedral, the Museum Service and Herefordshire Council officers. It is clear that a Project Planning Grant will have to be applied for, so detailed work can be undertaken to flesh out a learning programme for schools on Castle Green.
