have recently written to Herefordshire Council (on your behalf) to register our interest in the beautiful Georgian building that currently houses the Council's training department and the Youth Service's canoe centre in the corner of Castle Green, next to the River Wye. Because the Council are currently developing a new accommodation strategy, it is likely that this building will be declared

"surplus to requirements" by 2011 and, without firm proposals for its future, it could end up on the "disposals" list - a situation we should like to avoid!

Originally built during the Georgian period as an Art College, the building has suffered quite a lot of inappropriate development - the closing of the portico, the removal of the portico roof to make way for office space and the square brick extension stuck on to the wonderful Georgian facade! Informal discussions with Heritage Lottery lead the committee to believe that they would welcome a grant application for its restoration, putting it back into use for the benefit of the community as a whole. We envisage setting up a social enterprise to run a community cafe/restaurant, which in turn could provide employment and training for disadvantaged groups. The aim

A Children's Wassail on the Castle Green - Christmas Fayre 2009

he Castle Green is a very special historic site and the Friends would like to offer an opportunity for local school children to visit and perform a Wassail festival as a dazzling finale to the Christmas Fayre 2009.

Wassailing is a unique tradition which is deeply embedded in our County's culture and history, having been performed here for many hundreds of years. Its primary purpose is to celebrate the past apple crop and promote a good harvest for next year, but there's a lot of fun to be had along the way!

Last year's Christmas Fayre was the most successful to date, between two and three thousand people joined us to buy local crafts and produce, whilst listening to local music makers and sampling delicious food and drink. The Friends would like to extend this event by running a Wassail project in local primary schools which will culminate in the participation of the children (and their families!) in their very own Wassail at the close of the Christmas Fayre. There will be singing, dancing, storytelling and the performance of a Mummers play, accompanied by much merry making and audience participation!

We hope to offer this opportunity to learn about local culture and traditions completely free of charge to local schools to ensure no one is excluded. So if you have a child at a local school give the head teacher a prod and tell them to get involved!

Your Views on Yews & Views!

he Committee have recently approached Herefordshire's Parks & Countryside service to see if they would have any objection to us applying to remove six small and stunted yew trees on the Castle Green. Ordinarily, we would not support the cutting down of trees, but in this instance we think this idea is worth pursuing, so we would like to know what you think.

The trees in question run from the gents' end of the toilet block for a few metres towards Castle Street. We think these were originally planted as a yew hedge, but unmaintained, they have grown into rather stunted poor specimens, as can be seen in the picture. What is of more importance is that they completely block the lovely view of the Cathedral.

We believe, by removing these few trees, not only will that path become a brighter more pleasant route to take, but it will also improve the "passive policing" of the green by allowing local residents a direct view on to the Castle Green from their houses. Naturally we would want to plant the resulting flower bed with smaller (non-view-blocking!) shrubs and perennials.

Take a good look at the pictures or take a wander on the green and let us know if you agree with our ideas. Without your input we will find it difficult to get the permission we need, so please contact us, whatever you think!
